Silent donors "speak" volumes for Historic Club Home

Silence is golden. This couldn't be any more true than at the Historic Women's Club Home – and dozens of other nonprofit organizations throughout Marion County.

Most recently, the "silent" gift bestowed by the Ray & Charlotte Baldauf Trust provided \$12,500 in matching funds to replace the roof on our Historic Barlow Home, as well as the carriage house behind it. In 2019, that same trust, administered by Trustee and

Did you know?

"Healthy" Federation Facts

- ♦ In 1914, the Marion County Federation of Women's Clubs hired Marion's first public health nurse, paying for her salary.
- ◆ During the 1918 Flu Epidemic, the Federation supported Marion's "emergency hospital," recruiting & financing nurses.
- ◆ The Federation opened and financed Marion's first free clinic in 1924, offering medical and dental care. The group publicly supported and raised funds for the new Marion General Hospital.

longtime Marion Attorney Ron Cramer, helped purchase a new HVAC system in the Abigail Harding Lewis Auditorium.

When distributing discretionary income earned by the various trusts, Cramer explained, "We really look at things like the people behind the project, the number of volunteers and members, the organization's needs, and how we might be able to help."
